Rabbi Tarfon, a long ago Jewish scholar, said: "the day is short, and the work is plentiful, and the laborers are indolent. and the reward is great, and the master of the house is insistent." Main Line - Program Highlights



Zoom allowed us to bring speakers from all over the world. One example was our political affairs global round table discussion titled. International Perspective on the War in Ukraine. We had

panelists joining us virtually from Israel, Germany and Canada. In addition, last fall we offered The Great Outdoors class. We walked through various destinations during the course



and explored places such as Stoneleigh Natural Garden, Haverford College Trail, Cynwyd Heritage Trail, and more. We traveled virtually to China, Amsterdam, and to various museums around the world. We also celebrated Israel's 75th anniversary with special classes about Israel's politics, led by an Israeli

expert straight from Israel. During the summer months, we were able to take local trips to small museums around town and discovered places we have never been to. We also resumed our trips to New York City to see a Broadway show. The hit Some Like it Hot was a great success.

Lastly, we hosted a program which had over thirty people in attendance in person! As the COVID crisis subsides, we are seeing that more and more older adults are expressing the need to come out and socialize, seeking fitness, well-being, and intellectual stimulation to enrich their lives in retirement. As one member put it: "I like meeting new people during courses, classes, and events that Gems provides for us."

Bucks County - Program Highlights



The Bucks County Gems program has expanded its opportunities for lifelong learning and connectedness. With our members increased comfort level to be at in person programs, we are now offering two days of classes per week instead of one, with three to four different offerings in person. Over the last year, we have collaborated with a variety of community organizations including The Bucks County Kehillah, local



Bucks County synagogues, and 55+ communities.

A highlight of the Bucks County Gems program this year is our Gems On The Go: Movie & Brunch Program. We had an increase in attendance for each event. We had over forty people attend our last event. These programs foster

diverse discussions, connection and community building.

An added focus this year is our outreach to 55+ communities. We hosted a successful event at the Regency at Yardley which included breakfast, schmoozing and a lecture on the British Invasion of the 1960's. We hope to expand and develop this type of programming over the next year.

Merging with the Kaiserman JCC



Besides developing and running our local programs, we worked on our merger with the Kaiserman JCC. In the beginning of the year we identified a partnership with another not for profit as a great way for us to expand our

services to the community. We believe that through this merger we will be able to offer a holistic well-rounded program that will include enrichment, wellness, fitness programs, and more, geared toward older adults. We hope that this will bring a new audience to our new hub, Gems at the J. This hub, and its variety of services for our population, will enrich our community offering a meaningful way for people to age in their homes with dignity and purpose. We have already started the collaboration with the JCC and will share more information about the programs in the upcoming months. I would like to thank our board and our team for working extensively on this project. We couldn't have done this without their tireless efforts.
